Subject: 2018 Broadview Police Department Annual Report

It is my honor to present to you the Broadview Police Department's Annual Report for 2018. The report provides a summary of the Broadview Police Department's activity during 2018 and an overview of the department's operation and future direction. This report also provides a statistical overview of the crime and arrest trends during the past year. Our department is continually evaluating and adjusting our patrol strategies in order to be as effective and efficient as possible, while always striving to improve the quality of life for every Broadview resident.

Under the Emergency Telephone System Act, Emergency Telephone System Boards (ETSB) must serve a population of at least 25,000. In order to become compliant with the Emergency Telephone System Act, the Village of Broadview entered into an Intergovernmental Agreement with the Village of Maywood to combine dispatch centers. The Department of State Police & Office of the Statewide 9-1-1 Administrator also approved the consolidation of Broadview and Maywood's dispatch centers. This consolidation will be known as the Eisenhower "IKE" Emergency Telephone System Board.


The decision by the Mayor and the Village Board was to have a new 9-1-1 center built adjacent to the current police department. This new facility will house all employees of the "IKE" 9-1-1 center and will be responsible for dispatching police and fire personnel for the Village of Broadview and the Village of Maywood. A space needs assessment was conducted for the Village Hall as a whole. As a result of the space needs assessment, the Mayor and the Village Board authorized modification to the existing Police Department and Village Hall.

Implementation of the "IKE" 9-1-1 Center and the modification to the Police/Village Hall is scheduled to be completed in the spring of 2019.

I would like to recognize and thank all of the members of the Broadview Police Department for their dedication and service to the community. The department strives to provide quality services to our community. We as a department will continue to be partners within the community. I would also like to thank our residents, business partners and faith groups for their unwavering support and assistance throughout the year. Without these vital partnerships, our work would be much more difficult.

TABLE OF ORGANIZATION 2018






Organizational Summary

A Word from Chief Kevin Eugling

We have designed this report to be a resource for governmental entities, law enforcement agencies, journalists, and the residents of Broadview. The Office of the Chief consists of the Chief of Police, Deputy Chief of Police, and the Administrative Assistant to the Chief.

DEPUTY CHIEF Kevin Wagner is responsible for coordinating and supervising the day to day operations. He is responsible for planning, assigning, and supervising the activities of the Department. He is second in command to the Chief of Police and has command responsibility over all other members of the department.

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT TO THE CHIEF Patricia Williams works under the direction of the Chief, coordinates and performs a variety of confidential and complex secretarial functions; provides executive-level administrative support to the Chief of Police; schedules and coordinates meetings; prepares correspondence, reports, and other documentation; updates and maintains departmental records and files, and performs other related duties as assigned.

Personnel

The Broadview Police Department employed a total of 36 employees during 2018. Of the 36 employees, there were 29 full-time sworn officers and 7 civilian support staff (non-sworn personnel). 72% of the personnel are delegated to the Operations Division, and 22% of the personnel are delegated to the Administrative Division. All sworn personnel share in providing basic law enforcement service as needed. The Detectives and Administrative sworn officers routinely conduct preventative patrol and respond to calls for service when staffing needs are identified.

Operations Division

The largest single component within the Broadview Police Department is the Patrol Bureau. The Patrol Bureau is responsible for responding to emergency and non-emergency calls for service from the public, handling special assignments, and proactively addressing community concerns.

The Patrol Bureau is divided into two “pods” of officers who alternate 12 hour shifts in order to provide continuous 24 hour police services. Each shift is supervised by a Sergeant. The number of officers allocated to each shift is based on a staffing allocation formula that focuses on calls for services, and activity levels. In addition, the Village is divided into eight beats, with beat staffing tailored to meet the needs of that particular area.

Our response to alarm calls are an important function served by the department. While a high majority of our alarm responses were for alarms set off in error or equipment failure.

Alarm responses in 2018 were: 600 (compared to 621 in 2017) The continued decrease is likely because of the False Alarm Ordinance enacted in 2015.

The Operations Division is overseen by the Operations Commander, who is responsible for all Patrol Officers, their schedule and their performance. Within the Operations Division are the Patrol and Detective Bureaus, supervised by Sergeants. The Division Commander reports to the Deputy Chief, who in turn reports to the Chief of Police.



Administrative Division



Commander Tom Kostka

Administrative Division is responsible for coordinating Police Department efforts with other Village Departments, criminal justice agencies, and with the community.

The Administrative Division directs the overall administrative activities of the Police Department. Commander Tom Kostka supervised the division in 2018 and ensured that Department resources are used in the most efficient and effective manner. The administrative functions within the Division are: Records, 911 Center, and the Community Outreach Bureau. Further, the

911 and Records Supervision

The 911 Center and Records are overseen by Supervisor Paul Kurtzner who reports to Administrative Commander Tom Kostka.

Records maintained and managed over 19,200 reports for the year in 2018. Over 1,000 requests for reports were processed for distribution to the public. The records personnel also handle Freedom of Information requests, as well as, records checks of local records for city, state and federal jurisdictions.

In 2018, the Police Department collected \$253,519.37 in Traffic fines, \$21,700 in Village ordinance violation fines and \$65,500 in administrative tow fines, for a total collection of:

The Broadview Police Department's 911 Center is the heart of our communications section. When a 911 call is received, the caller's address immediately appears on our monitor. This is critical for your safety in situations where you may not be able to speak into the phone. Using computer technology, telecommunicators also access prior events from your address to give the officer's responding more information. We realize that in an emergency, you expect the person who answers the phone to be highly trained, professional and courteous.

Skilled Telecommunicators are always ready to assess your unique situation and dispatch the needed resources.

UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Based on a change in the Emergency Telephone System Act 50 ILCS 750, any Emergency Telephone System Board covering a service jurisdiction less than 25,000 residential population, must consolidate. This law came into effect January 2016.

Based on our population, this law *will* effect Broadview. We are currently in discussions with the Village of Maywood to assure that this transition is smooth and provides seamless service to everyone.

Community Outreach



Each year, thousands of Police agencies from across the country take to the rooftops of their local Dunkin' Donuts shops, to raise money for Special Olympics. Illinois We've been taking part in this fun and unique tradition since 2011, and we look forward to continuing our partnership well into the future. Look for us again this May.



In June, we participated in the Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics Illinois for the very first time. We joined police officers from surrounding towns to raise money and run from Westchester to Forest Park. We also ran in Bloomington, IL at the opening of the summer games of the Special Olympics. WESTAF



WESTAF (West Suburban Major Crimes Task Force) is a group of local investigators who respond as a team to serious crimes. In November 2017, WESTAF created a Major Crash Unit to respond to serious traffic crashes. (Prior to this, local agencies had to rely on the Illinois State Police, and the response times were often unreasonable long). This new local unit will provide member agencies rapid response of multiple trained investigators, with modern equipment, to approved crashes/incidents, to deliver expedient investigations.

Broadview has one officer assigned to the Major Crash Unit on an on-call basis.

Detective Bureau


In 2018, the Detective Bureau was staffed by two detectives, a tactical officer, and a task force officer assigned to a state wide drug and money laundering task force. The Detective Bureau is supervised by Sergeant Mike Akim who supervises criminal investigations and gang/narcotics investigations.

All Detective Bureau employees are assigned to a multi-jurisdictional task force called the “Triangle”. The “Triangle” task force focuses attention to high criminal activity areas in the Villages of Broadview, Maywood, and Bellwood. Task force operators use covert vehicles and the latest surveillance technology to identify and monitor gang/drug activity. In 2017, a strong relationship was formed with the 4th District Cook County State’s Attorney’s Office during prosecutions of gang members responsible for violence and drug trafficking.

Members of the Detective Bureau continually attend training in efforts to stay alert of criminal trends and new investigative technology. Detectives are certified evidence technicians and qualified to process crime scenes and collect forensic evidence. In the event a juvenile is suspected of a crime or the victim of a crime, detectives are certified to handle all juvenile protocols. Detective Bureau personnel are certified as “Lead Homicide Investigators” through the State of Illinois.

Detectives continue involvement in the West Suburban Major Crimes Task Force (WESTAF) and attend annual training for active shooter response and strategies used in the aftermath of a mass casualty incident. WESTAF provides smaller communities with big city resources including multilingual detectives, a forensic sketch artist, polygraph technicians, and human tracking capabilities.

During 2018, the Detective Bureau was assigned 391 total cases. Of the assigned cases, 294 were clear/closed with 48 arrests. This provided an arrest rate of 16.32%.



2018 Major Case Summary

On January 31, 2018, a Bloomingdale resident reported being robbed for \$300.00 and a cellular phone sim card after agreeing to purchase a cellular phone via Facebook Marketplace.

The Bloomingdale resident met a male subject in the alley of 24th Avenue and Roosevelt Road to look at the cellular phone. The male subject ran off with the phone and the resident's \$300.00.

Using social media, Broadview detectives learned the male subject's identity through past Facebook Marketplace transactions and located his home in Westchester. Detectives visited his Westchester home but were unsuccessful trying to interview the subject.

The subject decided to turn himself in to Broadview detectives and was charged with THEFT.

On February 25, 2018, the Broadview Detective Bureau responded to a two vehicle traffic crash near 9th Avenue and Roosevelt Road in the early morning hours. A male passenger was transported to Loyola Hospital Emergency Room and later pronounced deceased.

With the assistance of the Illinois State Police Accident Reconstruction Team, the crime scene was processed for pertinent evidence.

Detectives interviewed witnesses to the traffic crash. Detectives then drafted a search warrant for the driver's blood and urine for chemical testing. The Illinois State Police Forensic Science Center found levels of ethanol in the driver's blood as well as amphetamines, barbiturates, cocaine metabolite, opiates, PCP, and THC metabolite in the driver's urine.

After presenting the facts of the investigation to the Cook County State's Attorney's Office, the driver was charged with RECKLESS HOMICIDE and AGGRAVATED DUI.

On February 27, 2018, Builders Supply Outlet located at 2171 W. Cermak Road reported a credit card fraud for a loss of nearly \$5,000.00. The Broadview Detective Bureau investigated a male subject who used the credit card number belonging to another person to acquire goods from the store. The male subject used a U-Haul truck to transport the goods from the store.

Detectives utilized open source social media outlets and surveillance video to confirm the identity of the male subject. After numerous failed attempts to interview the male subject, due to the subject changing his phone number, an arrest warrant was granted by the Cook County Assistant State's Attorney's Office for FELONY THEFT BY DECEPTION.

The male subject surrendered himself to the Broadview Police Department after learning of his arrest warrant.

On May 7, 2018, the Broadview Patrol responded to an early morning burglary at Gold Elite Jewelers located at 1824 W. Roosevelt Road. A large brick was used to break the storefront window and gain entry. Approximately \$3,000.00 in jewelry was stolen from display cases. Detectives processed the crime scene.

Hours later, the Cicero Police Department disseminated a message to law enforcement agencies that jewelry trays containing necklaces and rings were found inside a vehicle. The vehicle fled from Cicero police and the occupants ran from the vehicle. All occupants of the vehicle were apprehended.

Broadview detectives reviewed video surveillance from Gold Elite Jewelers, acquired a search warrant for the vehicle, and interviewed occupants of the vehicle. Proceeds of the burglary were located in the vehicle and positively identified by the owner of Gold Elite Jewelers.

Two occupants of the vehicle were charged with BURLGARY by the Cook County State's Attorney's Office.

On October 13, 2018, Broadview Patrol responded to 2300 W. Roosevelt for a report of shot fired. After speaking with witnesses, two male subjects, known to Broadview police, were said to have fired two shots into an apartment after being asked to leave.

Patrol apprehended both subjects at 1921 S. 17th Avenue and transported to the Broadview Police Department for questioning. Approximately 60 grams of heroin (132 capsules) was recovered nearby during arrest.

The male subject, who witnesses observed shoot a gun into the apartment, was charged with AGGRAVATED DISCHARGE OF A FIREARM after review by the Cook County State's Attorney's Office.

On September 14, 2018, a male subject reported that his uncle shot at him and his girlfriend after an argument over money at 2100 S. 15th Avenue. The nephew stated the argument turned physical when his uncle retrieved a gun from his nearby vehicle. As both victims ran into their vehicle, the uncle started shooting into the vehicle. The victims fled the area and notified police.

Broadview detectives canvassed the area and spoke with neighbors in attempts to get more information and locate the uncle for questioning.

The following day, patrol located the uncle, as the passenger inside a vehicle, during a traffic stop at the National Beverage located at 1401 W. Roosevelt Road. A custodial search of the vehicle resulted in the recovery of approximately 5 lbs of cannabis.

Broadview detectives interviewed the uncle and occupants of the vehicle. The uncle was charged with AGGRAVATED DISCHARGE OF A FIREARM and POSSESSION OF CANNABIS WITH INTENT TO DELIVER by the State's Attorney's Office.

On November 26, 2018, the Broadview Police Department responded to an armed robbery in the area of 15th Avenue and Roosevelt Road. The male victim reported that he met a male subject at Pete's restaurant located at 1515 W. Roosevelt Road to sell his Iphone via the "Let Go" app. After the male subject looked at the Iphone, he displayed a handgun and told the victim to hand over the phone. The victim complied and the male subject ran from the area.

Minutes later, with the assistance of the victim, located the male offender with two other male subjects blocks from where the armed robbery occurred. All parties were transported to the Broadview Police Department for investigation.

During interviews, detectives learned that after the armed robbery, the offender hid the handgun inside a friend's apartment. The friend cooperated with detectives which led to the recovery of a semi-automatic handgun with a defaced serial number.

An Assistant State's Attorney reviewed the investigation and approved one count of ARMED ROBBERY against the offender.

Drug Destruction

In 2018 the Broadview, Bellwood, Westchester, Maywood, and Hillside Police Departments purchased a drug incinerator for EPA approved drug destruction. The drug incinerator is portable for on-site disposal of drug evidence, paraphernalia, syringes, and pharmaceuticals.

Fueled with wood or charcoal, the drug incinerator high velocity blowers create a cyclone of intense heat. A whirlwind of combustion reduces the burned material into a tiny pile of sterile ash with minimal air emissions.

The Broadview Tactical (Tac) Unit investigates gang and drug related activity in the Village of Broadview as well as surrounding towns. Tactical Officer Michael Carlson is responsible for writing and executing drug related search warrants, networking with other law enforcement agencies, and working with K9 Officer Ken Klammer on drug suppression.

Tactical Officer Carlson trained with experts in narcotics enforcement learning surveillance techniques and ways to conceal and sell narcotics. The tactical unit attends training in asset forfeiture law for Illinois.

The Tactical Unit has a strong relationship with the Narcotics Prosecutions Bureau of the Cook County State’s Attorney’s Office involving complex narcotics investigations.

Tactical Officer Carlson operated with the tactical unit from 2015 until July 2018. Officer Carlson now shares his many years of gang and narcotics expertise and knowledge with new patrol officers.

Operation Lexington II

In May 2018 Tactical Officer Michael Carlson initiated a narcotics investigation due to resident complaints of drug activity near 17th Avenue and Lexington (Broadview/Maywood). With the assistance of the Cook County Sheriff's Police Gang Unit and the Maywood Police Department, undercover investigators purchased crack cocaine and heroin from several local drug dealers.

After a three month investigation, a search warrant was served at a residence in the 1900 block of 18th Avenue in Maywood. Crack cocaine, heroin, cannabis, and currency were seized. Four individuals were arrested.

Tactical Officer Michael Carlson, Officer Eric Davis, and Officer Steven Larson networked with multiple law enforcement agencies, utilized informants, and gathered gang intelligence which resulted in a major disruption of gang activity in the Village of Broadview.

Tactical Officer Michael Carlson was awarded a Divisional Commendation for his dedication and outstanding contribution to this investigation.



Weapon Destruction

In February 2018 the Broadview Detective Bureau destroyed 141 weapons including handguns, shotguns and rifles that were confiscated or surrendered by residents. These weapons are pulverized in an ATF-approved process which documents the total destruction of each firearm individually.



Officer Training

Expert training is essential for a successful police department. Police officers must be trained extensively in federal and state law, evidence handling, prisoner transport, handcuffing, defensive tactics, firearms, driving, customer service and many other areas of law enforcement.

Police officers also need to be trained in professionalism and customer service. The very nature of policing requires officers to interact with the general public, so they need to have excellent problem-solving skills, be empathetic, courteous and respectful at all times.






POLICE BEAT MAP



2018 Calls by Beat




Total UCR Crime Report Trend 2014 - 2018









Budget Analysis


Operating Costs

The total operating budget for the Broadview Police Department for fiscal year 2018, which includes the period May 1, 2018 through April 30, 2019, is \$6,401,488.00. As illustrated in this chart, the largest single operating expense remains personnel services @ 71%. This figure is generally consistent with previous years. Contractual services consume an additional 9.6% of the Department's annual operating budget, while commodities consumes 2.3% and capital outlay represent 2.3% of all expenditures.

Police Accountability Command Sessions

The concept of PACS is to analyze numbers and locations of crimes and arrests as well as suspects, victims, days and times of criminal activity, and so forth, to identify crime patterns, clusters, suspects, and hot spots. Strategies are then formulated to counter increasing incidences of crime. The PACS process has encouraged creativity in strategies, allocating resources, and deploying police personnel while holding supervisors and employees accountable for confronting the problems of crime proactively.

The accountability sessions have ensured the appropriate supervisor is proactively monitoring the activity of his team by reviewing and analyzing reports, implementing a response to the analysis, and assessing the outcome of the response. In essence, consistent direction would be provided, performance would be measured, and accountability would be assured. This concept is not new to law enforcement, it is known as COMPSTAT, and began in New York City.

Accountability

Crash Review Committee

In 2017 we established a Crash Review Committee to investigate officer-involved traffic crashes. The committee is comprised of representatives from Command Staff, one Sergeant and one Patrol Officer. If after reviewing the details of the case, the committee determines the officer was at fault, the case is elevated to an Internal Investigation.

Internal Investigation

The purpose of establishing an internal investigation policy is to maintain professional conduct in the department. These procedures will assure prompt and thorough investigation of alleged violation of policies and, if needed, will facilitate suitable corrective action. In 2018, there were 7 internal investigations conducted, which is two fewer than in 2017. Department Recognition

In 2018, the following officers received department commendation for their excellent service to the community:

Officer: Michael Carlson

Recognition: Divisional Commendation

Action: Officer Carlson initiated a narcotics investigation due to complaints from residents. With assistance of CCSPD Gang unit and the Maywood Police Department, undercover officers purchased crack cocaine and heroin from several local drug dealers. After a three month investigation, a search warrant was served at a local residence. During the search warrant, crack cocaine, heroin and cannabis were seized and four individuals were arrested, resulting in a major disruption of gang activity in the village of Broadview.

Officer: Steven Larson

Recognition: Divisional Commendation

Action: Officer Larson responded to a call of an unresponsive female subject. He immediately began lifesaving chest compressions until paramedics arrived on scene. The patient survived, due in part to Officer Larson's actions. Three hours later, Officer Larson responded to a possible heroin overdose. Officer Larson administered his department-issued Narcan nasal spray and the patient regained consciousness moments later.

Officer: Detective Sergeant Michael Akim

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: While investigating an armed robbery, Sergeant Akim obtained a confession and consent to search the offender's apartment, which resulted in the recovery of a firearm used in the crime.

Officer: Detective Michael Bulava

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: While investigating a theft, Detective Bulava used open source social media and law enforcement networking to identify the offender. Based on this identification, the offender turned himself in and was subsequently charged with theft.

Officer: Detective Clayton

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: While investigating an armed robbery, Detective Clayton obtained a confession and consent to search the offender's apartment, which resulted in the recovery of a firearm used in the crime.



Officer(s): Officer Michael Carlson and Gustavo Galvan

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: Officer Carlson responded to an Armed Robbery in which the offenders fled the scene on foot. Officers Carlson arrived on scene and met with the victim. He obtained detailed descriptions of the offenders and broadcast that information to responding units. Based on those descriptions, Officer Galvan located the subjects nearby and they were identified by the victim. Later, detectives recovered a handgun from the apartment of one of the offenders, who was subsequently charged with Armed Robbery

Officer: Officer Eric Davis

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: Officer Davis stopped a vehicle for an equipment violation. He approached the vehicle and smelled burnt cannabis. He also determined the that the driver had a suspended drivers license and placed the driver under arrest. A search of the vehicle yielded a loaded 9mm handgun, a box of ammunition and cannabis. The driver was charged with Aggravated Unlawful Use of a Weapon.

Officer: Officer Eric Davis

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: Officer Davis stopped a vehicle for a traffic violation. While speaking with the occupants, he noticed the smell of burnt cannabis. Officer Davis removed the occupants and searched the interior of the vehicle, where he located a loaded .45 caliber handgun. The owner of the weapon did not have a FOID card or a concealed-carry license. The stop also yielded more than 45 grams of cannabis. The vehicle owner was charged with Unlawful Use of a Weapon.

Officer(s): Officer Ian Florentino, Officer Eric Davis and Officer Steve Larson

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: Officer Florentino and Officer Eric Davis developed confidential informants during daily patrol activities and learned of drug activity near 17th Ave and Lexington Street. The officers shared that information with the Detective Bureau and an undercover narcotics investigation was initiated. After a three month investigation, a search warrant was served. Crack cocaine, heroin, cannabis and currency were seized. Four individuals were charged.

Officer: Jorge Sanchez

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: Officer Sanchez responded to a call of a man down. Once on scene, Officer Sanchez discovered that the man was unconscious and not responding to stimulus. Officer Sanchez notified the Fire Department and administered his department-issued Narcan nasal spray. The man regained consciousness and refused medical treatment. Paramedics advised that this was a suspected heroin overdose and that Officer Sanchez's actions were directly responsible for the man regaining consciousness, possibly saving his life.



Officer: Alfonso Ruiz-Rangel

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: Officer Ruiz-Rangel responded to Super Target for a report of employee theft, with the offender not on scene. Four days later, while on patrol, Officer Ruiz-Rangel observed the suspect near her vehicle and took her into custody. After a thorough investigation and video taped confession, the Cook County Assistant State's Attorney's Office approved felony theft charges against the suspect.

Officer: Antonio Santucci

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: Officer Santucci responded to a personal injury motor vehicle crash. He immediately determined that the driver was not breathing and had no pulse. Officer Santucci pulled the driver from the vehicle and began lifesaving chest compressions. Medics arrived on scene and continued resuscitation efforts until the patient began breathing on his own. Medics credited Officer Santucci's efforts, saying that they were critical to the patient's survival.

Officer: Ryan Schiever

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: Officer Schiever responded to an ambulance assist at a business for a subject possibly having a heart attack. Once on scene, Officer Schiever determined that the patient was not breathing. Officer Schiever began lifesaving chest compressions until Paramedics arrived and took over. The patient survived and the Fire Department credited Officer Schiever's efforts, saying that they were critical to the patient's survival.

TCO: J.Santucci

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: TCO Santucci answered a 911 call from the victim of an Armed Robbery which had just occurred. TCO Santucci calmly dispatched officers, staying on the line with the caller to obtain as much information as possible. TCO Santucci provided details of the crime and descriptions to responding officers, who located the offenders nearby. Detectives recovered a handgun and one of the subjects was ultimately charged with Armed Robbery.

TCO: L. Radaszewski

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: TCO Radaszewski answered a 911 call for a subject possibly having a heart attack. TCO Radaszewski dispatched the call to officers and Fire Department personnel, providing clear and concise information. Officers quickly located the patient and began administering CPR. The patient lived and Fire Department Medics advised that TCO Radaszewski's professionalism was instrumental to his survival.

TCO: M. Pajewski

Recognition: Honorable Mention

Action: After dispatching officers to a jewelry store that had just been burglarized, TCO Pajewski monitored an incoming LEADS Type 3 message from another agency, which indicated that the agency had just apprehended two subjects who fled from a vehicle that contained jewelry in plain view. TCO Pajewski alerted his supervisor and contact with the agency was made. All proceeds were recovered and both subjects were charged with Burglary.






Officer: Commander Michael Kosik

Opioid Epidemic


Seconds Matter



Naloxone (brand name - NARCAN) is a fact acting drug which can quickly reverse the effects of opioids and save a person's life. It is used extensively by paramedics and emergency room staff.

In response to this epidemic, each one of our officers was trained to administer a dose of Naloxone if they respond to the scene of a possible overdose.

Often, our officers are first on scene and have a duty to do what they can to prevent a loss of life. In 2018, Broadview Police Officers administered 5 doses of Naloxone.
